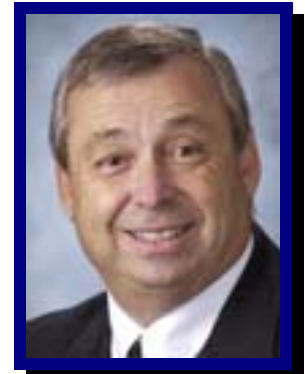

*I am pleased to present the 2007 Annual Report.*

*The year began as we said farewell to long serving Deputy Chief Jim Cunningham. Shortly after, the Service warmly welcomed Frank Elsner who took over the reins as Deputy Chief.*

*The year was particularly marked with unprecedented changes to staff in all ranks including the appointment of a new Superintendent, promotions to the ranks of Inspector, Staff Sergeant, Sergeant and the recruitment of several cadets and experienced officers which has brought many new faces to a variety of areas.*

*These changes throughout the year, coupled with a comprehensive organizational review, were undertaken with priorities and new initiatives identified. As the year unfolded, a number of changes were instituted.*

*Front line staff continued to serve as the main foundation for our Service. Our organizational structure is supported by the Criminal Investigation, Organizational Support and Uniform Divisions which continued to evolve in response to the changing needs of the City of Greater Sudbury.*

*Civilian staff throughout the organization brought diverse and specialized skills in areas of records management, statistics, forensics, training, human resources, payroll, finance, purchasing, stores, property, technology, communications, clerical support, crime analysis, fleet, facilities and other areas.*

## OVERVIEW

The Greater Sudbury Police Service serves **157,857** people residing in a total land area of **3,354.34** square kilometers, as well as several unincorporated townships. When including the **233** named lakes within its municipal boundaries, the total area of the City is **3,627** square kilometers<sup>1</sup>, making it the largest municipality in Ontario based on total area. Municipal amalgamation on January 1, 2001 added **73** lakes to the City with Lake Wahnapiitae becoming the largest city-contained lake in the world. When compared to other key Ontario municipalities in relation to land area, Greater Sudbury is the largest municipality in the Province. The Service employs **255** uniformed members and **103** civilian staff.

### Highlights of 2007:

#### **LIONEL E. LALONDE CENTRE (LEL) - DISTRICT 2**

The Lionel E. Lalonde Centre partnership initiative involving Police, Fire, Emergency Medical Services and Emergency Management became a reality. All four agencies have moved in and are fully operational with Phase 1 completed. Officers from Walden, Valley East and Rayside Balfour are now reporting directly to District 2, as well as the Property Branch and the Traffic Management Unit. The Rural Squad comprised of 6 officers and 1 Sergeant was introduced for the purposes of targeting incidents that are unique to outlying areas.

#### **CYBER CRIME UNIT**

As the presence of computers within the typical home has increased, so has the number of calls for service received by the Greater Sudbury Police Service in relation to computer crime. The Greater Sudbury Police Service has partnered with the Ontario Provincial Strategy - Internet Crimes against Children to address child exploitation and Computer/Internet crimes. As a result of the partnership and additional funding, the Cyber Crime Unit has been able to expand in 2007 to include a full time Victim Identification Officer and Computer Forensic Officer. In 2007, the Unit was responsible for one of the largest seizures of child pornography in Ontario. The investigation resulted in charges of possession of child pornography being laid against a local resident.

## **CITIZENS ON PATROL**

Citizens on Patrol is a program dedicated to improving communities. The participants are citizens who have concerns for the safety of persons and security of property in their neighbourhoods. Interested applicants must meet the criteria stipulated and be amenable to the specified tasks and responsibilities. In 2007, City Council approved the Program as a part of the Police Service's Budget with a Coordinator being appointed in June. The program boasts a new radio system, vehicles and a bilingual logo.

## **BUSINESS PLANNING**

In January 2007, the Police Service began the process of developing our 2008 - 2010 Business Plan. A comprehensive process of both internal and external consultation was undertaken to determine organizational priorities, critical issues and necessary initiatives for our next three-year planning cycle. The process of external consultation included a series of community meetings with residents and representatives of Community Action Networks, as well as an Oraclepoll community survey on policing. Internal consultation included the distribution of a survey to our members to capture their views of the organization and an extensive organizational review which included members' forums and discussion groups.

## **GOVERNMENT PARTNERSHIPS AND GRANTS**

Through a variety of government grants and partnerships, the Service received close to 1.7 million dollars in funding. These funds came in the form of RIDE; Community Policing Partnership Program; Safer Communities - 1000 Officer Partnership Program; Bear Wise Media Campaign; Domestic Violence Unit Evaluation; Bail Safety Program; Empowering Our Youth Providing Alternatives; and A Provincial Strategy to Protect Children from Sexual Abuse and Exploitation on the Internet - a United Team Approach.

## **HUMAN RESOURCES**

The first ever service-wide Workforce Census was conducted. Large volumes of valuable information were gathered which will assist in the deployment, recruitment and the development of workplace systems in support of our members. In an effort to ensure that the diverse needs of our community continue to be met, the Service developed the Police Aboriginal Recruitment Video which was unveiled at a Northern Ontario police recruitment conference in May 2007. The event was well attended by students throughout our area and honoured with the attendance of Farley Flex, Canadian Idol Judge, as the keynote speaker.



## RETIREMENT / APPOINTMENT - DEPUTY CHIEF OF POLICE

### **James Cunningham**

After 38 years in the policing profession, Deputy Chief Jim Cunningham retired. He commenced his policing career with the Ontario Provincial Police in 1966, joined the Copper Cliff Police Force in 1970 and became a member of the Sudbury Regional Police when the forces amalgamated in 1973. He worked in most areas of the police service, achieving the rank of Deputy Chief on July 31, 1995.

### **Frank Elsner**

After an extensive two month internal and provincial search for a replacement, Frank Elsner, Deputy Chief of Police with the Owen Sound Police Service was selected as the successful candidate. Deputy Chief Elsner is a 25 year veteran with 6 1/2 years as the Deputy Chief in Owen Sound. He began his career with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in 1982, moving to the Ontario Provincial Police in 1985 and then joined the Thunder Bay Police Service in 1987. He holds a Bachelors Degree in Political Science with a minor in Law from Lakehead University and a Masters Degree in Public Administration from the University of Western Ontario.

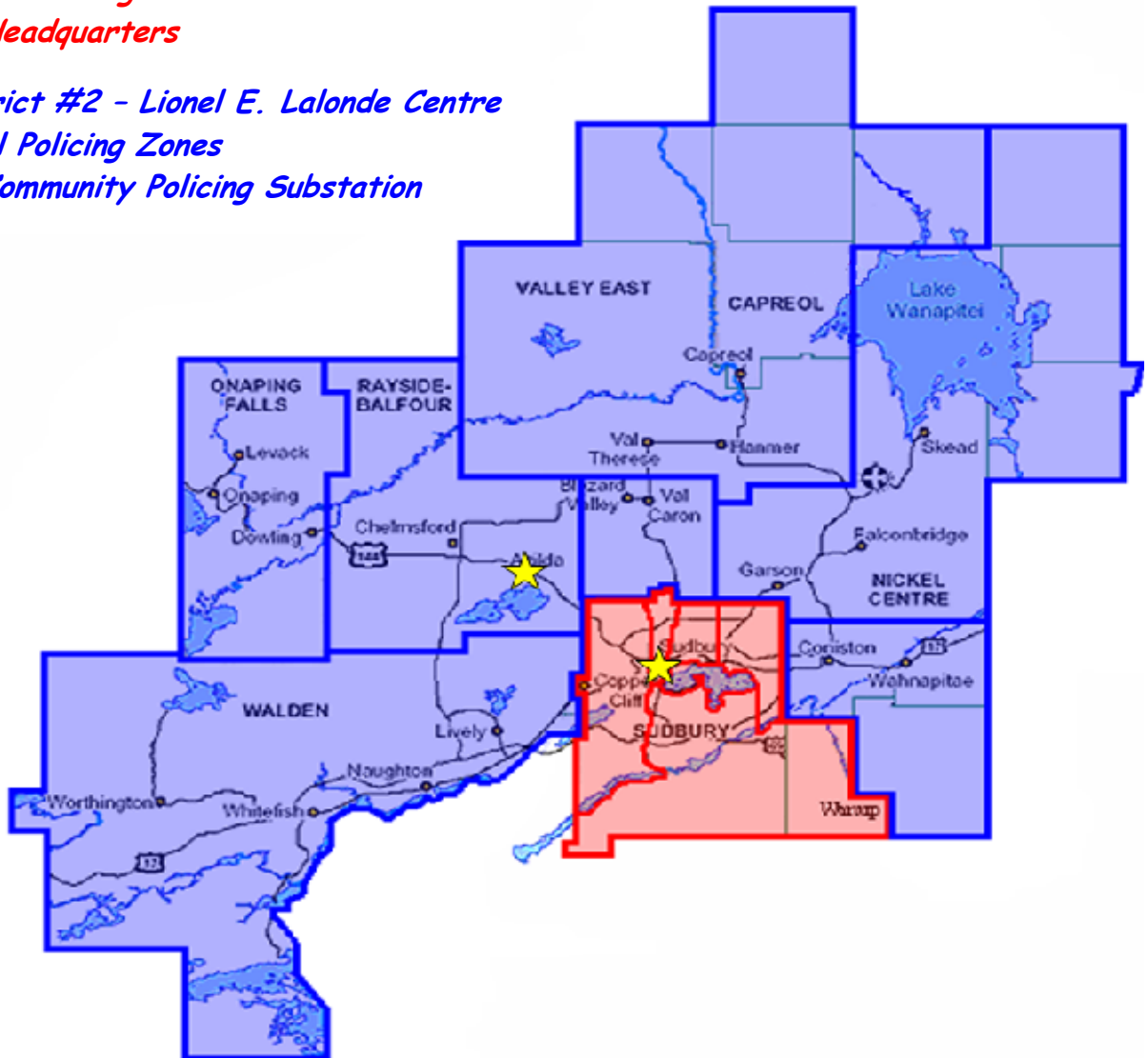

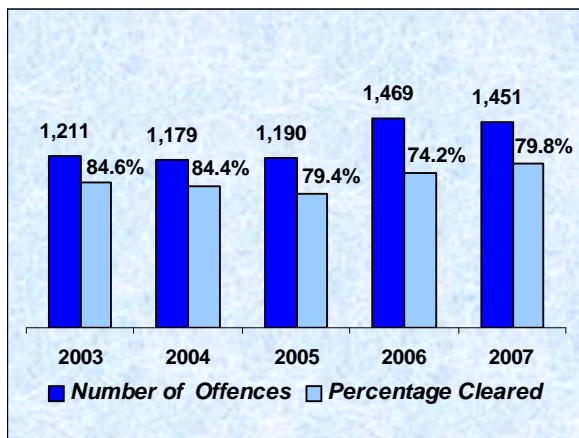

### FIVE YEAR TRENDS



A joint forces investigation between the Ontario Provincial Police and the Greater Sudbury Police Service into the disappearance of a local male was successfully concluded with the arrest of the individual responsible for his murder. The matter is presently before the courts.

The Criminal Investigations Division also successfully investigated 3 other homicides in 2007. In each incident the individual responsible has been identified and the matters are presently before the courts.



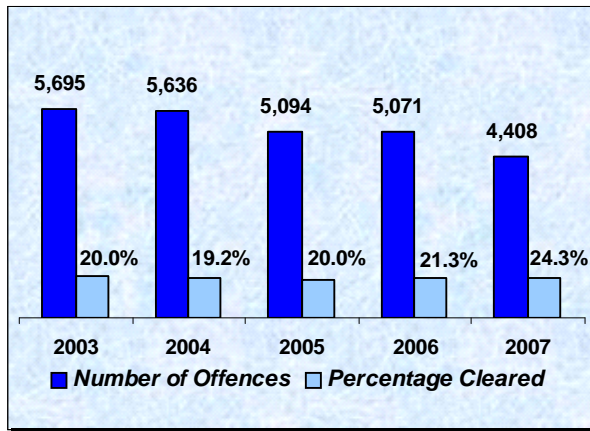

### FIVE YEAR TRENDS



The Street Crime Unit laid a total of 872 *Criminal Code* charges and recovered in excess of \$550,000 worth of stolen property. A Property Crime Unit Coordinator position was added to the Street Crime Unit in 2007. This position was created in direct response to the recommendations received by the Police Service during our community consultation. The Property Crime Unit Coordinator will ensure quality control of property crime investigations and increase communication between our police service and victims of crime.

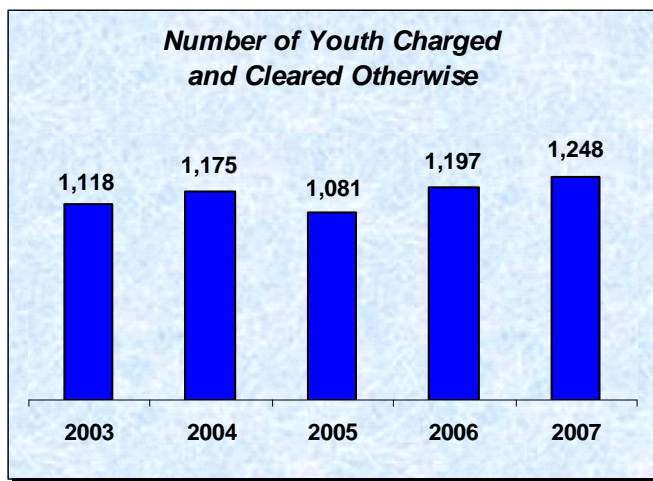


## YOUTH CRIME

**Goal - To reduce youth crime and to address the community's concern with youth issues.**

In 2007, there were 271 youths directed to the Youth Referral Program (YRP) and of those, 75% completed the contract. The Program was developed as a result of the *Youth Criminal Justice Act* in order to assist front-line officers when dealing with less serious offences committed by youth. The Youth Referral Coordinator meets with first-time, non-violent offenders, their guardian(s) and occasionally the victim to repair the harm done. The contract is 3 months long and no charges are laid if the youth follows the contract.

## CRIME PREVENTION

**Goal - To continue to develop and implement innovative and progressive crime prevention strategies in collaboration with our community partners.**

In 2007, Crime Prevention Officers made over 300 visits to area schools delivering programs to an audience of approximately 30,000 students. This year, 25 area elementary schools received the Values, Influences and Peers (VIP) program with 993 grade six students participating. Crime Prevention Officers were also busy with the delivery of programs to businesses, groups and associations. Presentations, including but not limited to, Cyber-Proofing Youth Child and Identity Theft, were made before an audience of approximately 3,500 citizens. The programs that were most requested in 2007 were Bullying, Cyber-Proofing and Identity Theft.



## TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

The Traffic Management Unit works closely with many community partners with the intent of improving road safety within the City of Greater Sudbury. To that end, it is important to note that the Unit investigated 5 motor vehicle fatalities in 2007. The assigned officers laid 6,969 *Highway Traffic Act* charges and 117 *Criminal Code* charges.



Our fleet was expanded to include a Harbourcraft boat designed for patrol on large bodies of water. This will assist in improving visibility and enforcement on our many waterways throughout the area.

On June 8<sup>th</sup>, 2007 in partnership with the Sudbury Kartclub, the Sudbury Road Safety Committee held a "Keep It On Track Event". This initiative was designed to deter street-racing and promote on-track competitions.



## DRUGS AND ORGANIZED CRIME

Goal - To continue to effectively target illegal drug use, organized crime and related criminal activities in our community.

The plain clothes component of the Criminal Investigations Branch, comprised of the Drug Unit, Street Crime Unit and Intelligence Unit was extremely busy in 2007. Intelligence and drug officers have noted a marked increase in the presence of illegal gang activity and associated crime migrating northward from the Toronto Area to Greater Sudbury. This increased gang presence and associated criminal activity was the focus of a successful High Enforcement Activity Teams (HEAT) initiative in the fall.

With the assistance of the Uniform Division, a six week project named Project COLA was conducted to address a noted increase in crack cocaine. The project targeted known crack houses and individuals actively trafficking in illegal narcotics. At the conclusion of the investigation, 127 individuals were charged with 469 criminal charges. Approximately \$210,000 of illegal narcotics, several prohibited weapons and \$25,000 cash were seized during the project.

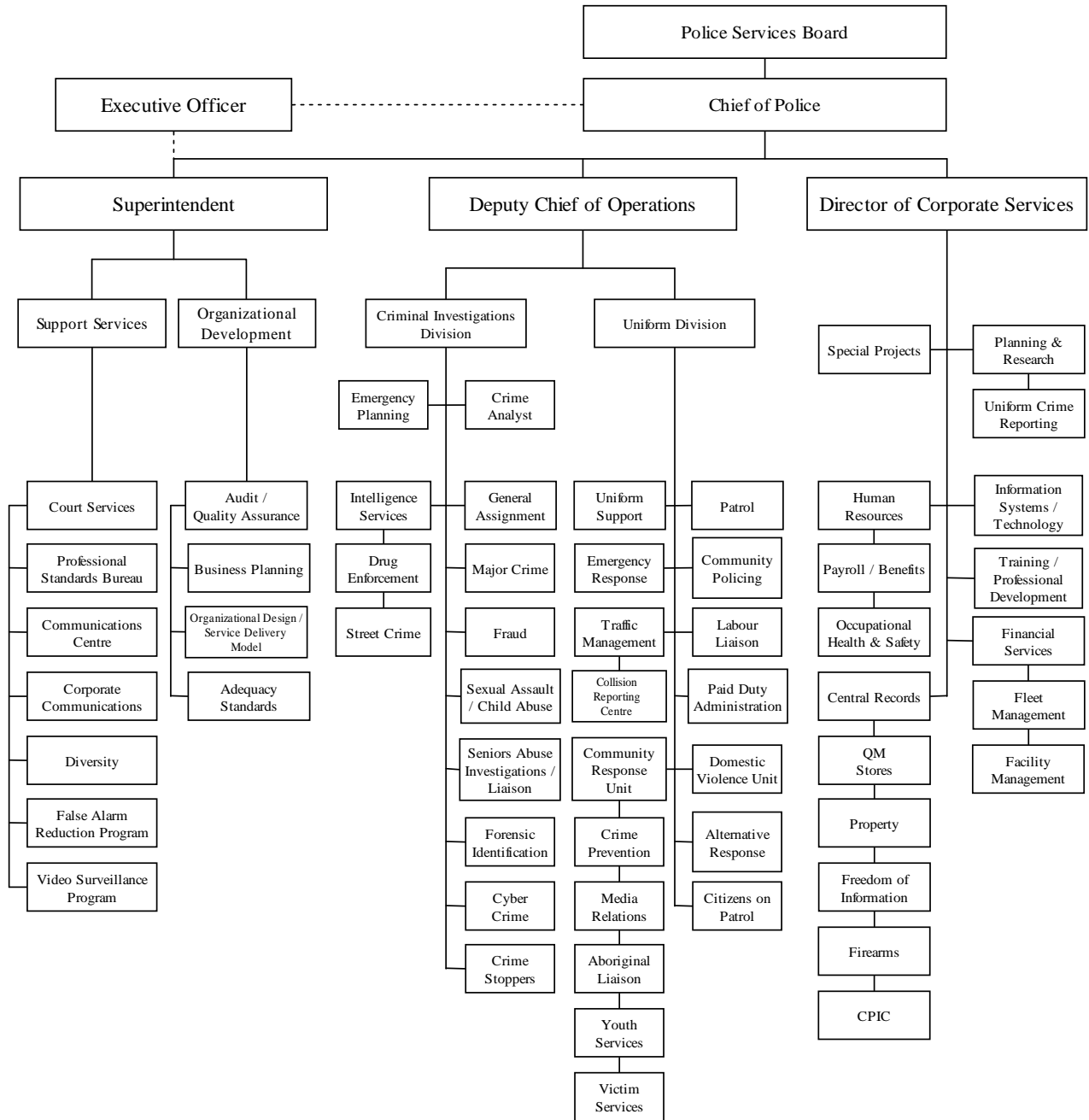

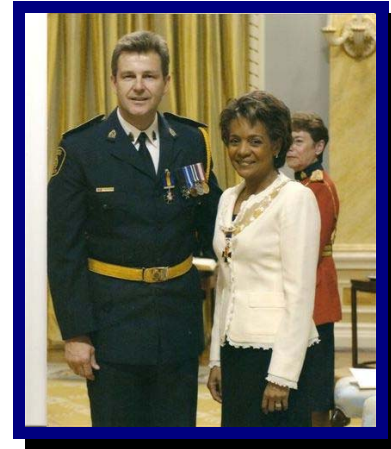

## ORDER OF MERIT FOR THE POLICE FORCES

Chief Ian Davidson was appointed to the Order of Merit of the Police Forces. The Order of Merit of the Police Forces was established in October 2000 to recognize commitment to this country and to honour a career of exceptional service or distinctive merit displayed by the men and women of Canadian Police Services. The event was run by GSPS personnel, members of the CN Police, the Ontario Provincial Police and the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services as well as Police Foundation students from Cambrian College and College Boréal. Special Olympians were also on hand as eager participants. The event raised \$15,465.00
