Do More with Same Resources

- Demands for same levels of service but with funding shortfalls and possible cuts
- Expectations for more
- Wait times are increasing
- Emergency vs. Non-Emergency calls
- Increased administrative time and extensive paperwork
- Court testimony time
- Training demands create absences impacting on available staffing





What does this create?

Human Resource Impacts

- Stress
- Heavier workload
- Physical Injuries versus Invisible Injuries

Budgets

- WSIB premiums up by 85% since 2015
- Staffing pressures due to absences/accommodated duty part time staffing costs
- Investment in health and wellness programs
- Demands for specialized equipment
- Requirements for special purpose built facility/furnishings

Service Delivery

- Impacts on calls for service queue
- Lack of staff resulting in delayed response
- Increased wait times


• Opioid Crisis






Average Availability – Dayshift

Public Perception and Expectations

- Police visibility in neighbourhoods
- Just-in-time communications and updates on events in progress
- 7/24 hour availability touch of a button access on all types of calls; not necessarily police related
- High level of accountability
- Lack of trust
- Perception that policing costs too much





Functions of a Sworn Officer versus Non-Sworn

Both a Sworn and Non-Sworn Officer can:

Prevent crime Keep the peace Assist victims

Only a Sworn Officer can:

Apprehend criminals Lay charges Execute warrants

Current Funding Model

Policing is funded by the Municipal Tax levy primarily

- Inequitable formula by the very nature of municipal capacity in terms of growth/business/residential development
- Some areas have seen exponential growth in recent years which have yielded significant revenues through development charges while others have seen stable if not declining growth
- Provides for additional staffing due to population growth, and sheer demands on the business of policing

Federal capital investment programs have not had any allocations for capital improvement projects such as police facilities.



Moving Forward

Focus on:

- That which poses the greatest risk
- Core functions of Sworn Officers
- Upstream thinking and partnerships
- Investment in community safety directly correlates to costs of policing
- Staffing models that address expected rates of absenteeism
- Mental health and well-being of our people so they can focus on the safety and well-being of our community
